# Boix vs. Acemoglu

- Focus is not exactly the same
  - · Boix aims to explain origins of institutions
  - Acemoglu aims to explain consequences of institutions
- Of course, many related pieces
  - ${\scriptstyle \bullet \,}$  Monarchs  $\approx$  extractive institutions
  - ${\scriptstyle \bullet }$  Republics  $\approx$  inclusive institutions
  - How do the theories explain the development or lack thereof of particular states/societies?
- Clarity of exposition
- Ability to connect both pieces in a meaningful way

- Clarity or presentation and consistency of arguments
- Providing context to the case (e.g., some data on the prevalence of the social norm)
- Solid argument on rationale behind its disappearance (does not mean anyone needs to agree)
- Bonus: data supporting the argument

- In three-page essays (in economics) you don't need to summarize what you will do
- Twitter threads excelled here
- One tweet: one idea
- For essays: one idea per paragraph
- Reading the first sentence of each paragraph should be enough
- Then paragraphs develop key initial idea

  - Education in India (Duflo et al. 2012) details

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# Voting to Tell Others (DellaVigna et al., 2016)

- USA
- Key: actual voting is known
- Leaflets: announcing survey on past voting
- Leaflets: announcing survey
- Non-voters sort out
- For a small fee, they sort in again

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# CSR: HHL Solutions, LLC (List et al. 2019)

- Corporate Social Rsponsiblity
- HHL Solutions created (consulting)
- Vary emphasis on CSR on ads
- Vary emphasis on CSR once hired
- Better-qualified applications when CSR
- More effort when reminders on CSR

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# Education in India (Duflo et al. 2012)

- Udaipur district, India.
- 40% missing rates teachers
- Control group (60 schools): usual reminder of fire threat, 1 random visit per month. 1K rupees.
- Treatment group (60 schools): one camera. Payment varies from 500 to 1.3K rupees
- On average, absence  $\downarrow$  by 22%
- Imagine the number of school hours this represents for kids!

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# Field experiments

- Ethics? See Melbourne case with buses
- Pre-treatment plans
- On the rise
- Economics shifted from "general equilibrium" to "policy outcomes" since the 1990s

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




Fig. 3. Actual versus predicted reporting rates. (A) Actual reporting rates in the United States for each condition (n = 800 observations). Error bars represent robust standard errors. (B) Average predicted reporting rates for the United States by our nonexpert sample (n = 299 individuals). Error bars represent robust standard errors clustered by participants. (C) Average predicted reporting rates
